Membership

I'm concerned that some Voiture Locales are not familiar with the constitutional requirements for membership. Let's look at the requirements for membership eligibility, Article IV of the Constitution of La Société des Quarante Hommes et Huit Chevaux is very explicit. No persons, other than honorably discharged U.S. military personnel and active duty U.S. military, may become members. There are no ifs, ands or buts about it. You **cannot** discriminate

based upon gender or race. There is **NO** requirement that a prospective member be a member of the American Legion.

Article V forbids Honorary Membership in La Société.

I know many of you belong to various veteran organizations, look at those members as possible members of your locale and ask them to join with us. We need to start now to recruit as well as retain. We are losing more members through death and walking out the back door than we are bringing in the front door. Let's turn that around!!!

The "Trickle Down Effect" of Membership and PR

By "trickle down" we usually mean an economic effect that has been around a long time but generally attributed to Ronald Reagan as an economic stimulus plan—and it seemed to work.

But I like the term trickle down in the aspect of doing something that has a beneficial effect on other things, and it gets built on or passed on—spreading. Let's look at membership first, then public relations ... Let's start with leadership in your Locale or Grand and perhaps even Nationale. Isn't it fair to say that the motivation, attitudes and behavior of one or more persons affects others? Of course. A lack of motivation, an apathetic attitude or behavior by anyone can have a negative effect that spreads or stops growth. But wow, imagine the opposite. An ener-getic, motivated, involved group of people leading will be the start of an infectious attitude that everybody catches. We learn from each other. In particular, we learn from observing and interacting with those who are hopefully good mentors. Bluntly spoken, banging the gavel alone will not suffice. The gavel is symbolically placed in the hands of the Chef to help remind him

to give proper instruction, to lead the membership where they should go, and to set them on the path to contemplate, strategize and plan for bigger and better things—the positive result will be growth, an energized and motivated membership and programs working.

The trickle-down effect for public relations is endless...but first and foremost, there must be some kind of PR program or action in order to have this effect. It has always been my opinion that public relations or the lack thereof is one of the weakest links in La Société programs. Actually, public relations is not a program, but a mechanism and strategy to promote your Locale or Grand within the community and internally to members. No "program" - no trickle down. We've discussed in the Bulletin and the PR Manual the positive effects of a good PR

program—I want to address briefly newsletters. A good newsletter and its information trickles down to the membership. An internal newsletter is not only a communications tool, but also serves to unite your membership and make them more loyal. When your Voyageur's Militaire know what is going on, attendance at promenades increases, there is more retention of members.

The general happiness of our membership grows in direct proportion to the zeal and ability with which our leaders demonstrate the principles of La Société—then that zeal "trickles down."• L'Editeur

"Boys, I really appreciate it," President Truman is saying to a committee of Voyageurs from Voiture Trois, Kansas City, Mo., who are presenting him with a life membership card in the Forty and Eight. The President is now the only Voyageur who doesn't have to pay dues, the first ever to receive a life membership in La Societe.

At the immediate right of the President is Carl Hise, Correspondant of Voiture Trois, with the gold membership card in his hand. At the President's left in the front is John S. Cannon, Chef de Gare, who made the presentation. The ceremony took place on the lawn of the summer White House in Independence, Missouri.

President Truman has been a member of the Kansas City Voiture for twenty years. He seemed very pleased to see the old timers of the Voiture and enjoyed reminiscing about the time he was Wrecked back in 1925, just before the Promenade Nationale in Omaha. 

First order of business was breakfast in the Pine Room at Fred Harvey's, followed by an inspection tour of Voiture Trois' Abri, then an informal get-together at the President Hotel headquarters, with an abundance of hospitality and good comradeship.
